

LOOKING FORWARD TO MESSIAH AT 100 (2047-48)

One simple way to benefit Messiah is to designate the congregation as the beneficiary of a bank account, life insurance policy, or brokerage account. Do this – while you are alive! – with the company with whom you hold the account. It can usually be done at no cost and without a lawyer, and typically avoids the probate process and fees. DONATE YOUR APPRECIATED SECURITIES TO MESSIAH AND SKIP THE CAPITAL GAINS TAX

Donating appreciated securities (e.g. stocks and bonds) can be a tax-efficient way to support Messiah. Appreciated securities you've owned for at least a year and donated directly to Messiah generally do not incur federal capital gains tax, so the full value of your asset goes to Messiah and is typically deductible if you itemize, subject to federal and state limits. QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTIONS FROM AN IRA

Federal law allows taxpayers who are at least age 70 ½ and owners of Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) to distribute money from an IRA directly to a charity of the owner's choice. This is called a qualified charitable distribution (QCD) and has the advantage of not counting as federally taxable income, but still counting toward a required minimum distribution. QCDs have been possible for many years, but since the federal tax reform of 2017, with so many more people taking the standard deduction instead of itemizing, QCDs are advantageous for many more of us than they used to be, especially for owners of traditional (rather than Roth) IRAs. It's a way to reduce income without having to deduct it (because you never receive it -- it goes directly from your IRA account to the charity). MESSIAH CELEBRATES REFORMATION DAY

Five hundred and six years ago, the Protestant Reformation brought the church's focus back to God's free gift of salvation in Jesus Christ. On Oct. 31, 1517, Martin Luther posted his 95 Theses — the "Disputation on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences" — on the church door in Wittenberg, Germany, igniting the Protestant Reformation.

To mark this occasion, Messiah celebrated the 22nd Sunday after Pentecost (October 29) with what Pastor Erhardt referred to as "a taste of the Reformation theme." After this auspicious start to the day, several of Messiah's members then attended a special Reformation vespers service at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Lawrenceville, organized by Bethany Evangelical Lutheran Church, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, St. Peter Lutheran Church, and Messiah. The worship service, which featured many hymns, as well as a beautiful anthem sung by a multi-congregation pickup choir and a solo, was followed by a potluck supper and much mingling and fellowship.

EXPLORING THE NEW ARCHITECTURE AT PRINCETON UNIVERSITY



Whitman College is a 21st century example of Collegiate Gothic.

Jon Hlafter led one of his popular walking tours of notable architecture on the Princeton campus on Sunday, October 1, this time focusing on some of the newer buildings.

The 2½ hour tour incorporated most of the modern buildings constructed at the southern end of the campus in the late 20th and early 21st centuries, from Spelman Hall dormitory (1971) to the Lewis Center for the Arts (2017) near the new Dinky station. Surprisingly, it also included a Collegiate Gothic dormitory complex, Whitman College, which was completed in 2008.
